## SMPTE Business Meeting: New Rates for Dues and Subscriptions

The Society's Financial Advisory Committee in its deliberations and discharge of its duties has recommended an increase in membership dues. This proposal was approved by the Society's Executive Committee and Board of Governors and announced by President J. W. Servies, p. 673 of the September, 1962, *Journal*. The factors of cost increases since the dues rates established in 1955 and the work and service of the Society now being planned were the basis for asking the membership to vote a dues increase.

The proposed increase in annual membership dues was brought before the Business Meeting of the Society's membership held October 22, 1962, during the 92d Convention in Chicago. At this meeting the membership approved the following:

Effective January 1, 1963, annual dues for Fellow and Active Members, \$20.00; Associate Member dues, \$15.00. Student Member dues remain unchanged at \$5.00.

Subscription rate for the *Journal*, beginning January 1, is \$16.00 per year; and outside Continental United States, \$17.00. Single copy rates remain unchanged.
