this year's conference program," he said. "Nonmainstream presentation mediums, such as theme parks, Imax, and Showscan, are a technology in their own right. It is this special venue technology that is the driving development in the film industry, creating new film and projection systems. This year we plan to cover all types of variants."

Sessions during the conference will also address the traditional areas

of motion-picture, television, and computer imaging, as well as multimedia technology, digital video compression, advanced television, and film and the environment.

### All-Day Seminars to Precede Conference

As an added educational opportunity, two all-day tutorials will precede the conference on October 29. One session will focus on Special Venues, while the other will be a joint session presented by the SMPTE and the ITU-RCB, the successor to the CCIR, on digital terrestrial television broadcasting (DTTB).

### Equipment Exhibit

An impressive equipment exhibit featuring the industry's newest products and latest innovations will complement the technical program. To date, a large number of leading manufacturers have already reserved space for this year's exhibit.

In addition, the Society is looking forward to the repeat of many successful highlights from previous conferences, including the distribution of Bonus Certificate Booklets, which will offer various incentives,

bonuses, discounts, and giveaways; the New Technology Room, which will again be located on the exhibit floor; hands-on workshops; and a Student Education Fair, which will offer high school and junior college students an opportunity to consult with representatives from colleges, universities, and trade schools on career opportunities in the image-making field.
